


# **One Conversation Workshop Books**

### 1. God Space – Doug Pollock (shopping link)







## 4. How to Talk about Jesus (Without Being That Guy) – Sam Chan (shopping link)





# Evangelism as Exiles: Life on Mission as Strangers in our Own Land – *Elliot Clark* (shopping link)




